The design of the blanket encompasses all areas of Native Culture. The zig zag designs represent traditional plains tribes as well as the sharks tooth from the Hawaiian Islands, the center design is derived from a very old Alaska Native basket and the crosses are from the Woodland tribes. The seven designs around the center circles represent the pacific rim from the Hawaiians. The ribbon is unfurled to symbolize opening the conversation about HIV/AIDS.

The design for this Pendleton blanket is a collaborative effort between Colorado State University's Center for Applied Studies in American Ethnicity, Inter Tribal Council of Arizona, Inc., and the National Native American AIDS Prevention Center.
